Everything on hold until we are out of lockdown.

Independent State MP Alex Greenwich has announced his proposed bill in support of voluntary assisted dying. We thank our parishioner Warwick Benson who has provided us with the following reflection raising perspectives that you may find insightful. Next week's bulletin reflection will begin to open up the faith and moral implications around this issue.

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All of us are aware and some have personal experience of people with a terminal illness or those living with severe mental or physical difficulties. Why is there not a legal option in these circumstances for their suffering to be ended? Such is the proposed legislation coming before the NSW Parliament. There are many issues to consider and controversy around the proposed legalising of euthanasia ("a good death") in those terminally ill. In some countries, voluntary suicide (physician-assisted or otherwise) in those who may not have life-limited illness but have irretrievable existential suffering or severe disabilities now, legally have the choice. In the majority of those availing themselves of the choice, even those dying with cancer, the reason given is not pain but loss of autonomy, overwhelming feelings of despair and life totally devoid of meaning.

In medical ethics there are often quoted "four pillars" to consider in medical procedures for the management of complicated illness. These are relevant to discussions on legalised euthanasia: **beneficence** (doing good), **non-maleficence** (not doing harm), **autonomy** (the person's freedom of choice), **Justice** (ensuring fairness).

As in so many areas of life today, autonomy has become the dominant factor on which we decide (*whatever I want I should have the right to request and if available receive it*). The dilemma is often that such approaches may not necessarily be without **harm** to others or indeed **just** if it limits access of others to treatment or in the case of issues such as euthanasia – the impacts on the linguistically, culturally, and religiously diffuse segments of our society.

Other groups within our society who have expressed anxiety are those with disabilities, who may be made to feel a burden on others and who are presumed to have a life devoid of meaning and hope so why not have the freedom to end it. More resources to improve the quality and access to good supportive and palliative care are needed. However, there is a concern that many in our community with fears about euthanasia may be fearful that these services are another form of euthanasia and be disadvantaged. There have been extensive surveys and articles in the medical literature which review the experience in jurisdictions which have introduced legislation allowing for euthanasia and voluntary suicide.

Consideration of issues of race, class and gender have received limited attention in proceeding down this path. Several studies have also revealed that the majority of people exercising these choices are white males dying from cancer. In several states in the USA, it is clear that the poor, people of colour and the uneducated are either opposed to euthanasia or harbour deep fears should they find themselves in a medical institution who may decide or persuade them to accept this course of action. To quote from one study* "what is deemed a liberating practice for one group may be experienced as an oppressive or abusive practice for another group. Paying heed to the diversity of lived experience generated by multiple and interpenetrating relations of privilege and oppression could provide us with fresh perspectives on euthanasia.

Keep Small Strong

During COVID-19 we have had various restrictions placed on us as a community. These restrictions have increased and decreased over the year. Having to stay at home - or in our local areas, people have changed their focus to our local community rather than other major issues. A great local program that was run through the Holy Name of Mary Parish was the 'Forget me not program'. This program was started by Marea De Angelis and other parishioners. "It's a program that started in the parish to help the elderly and struggling families during COVID-19" said Marea.

"I got together a group of 75 parishioners to help me. They went out and mowed lawns, picked up groceries, dropped off meals and called parishioners to check up on them".

"We even started a crocheting and knitting group in the church hall. It was socially distanced of course! We made twiddle muffs - to help sufferers of dementia and gave them to nursing homes in the area" said Marea.

The program has now finished "I'd definitely love to do it again. It was delightful! Some of the volunteers are still in regular contact with the elderly parishioners"

A year later, we are in a new normal. The possibility of COVID-19 restrictions is a part of our daily lives and many people are refocussing on major issues. We should still focus on our local community and keep small strong!
