THE EASTER EXPERIENCE: Resurrection a Slow Realisation

The ultimate physical, mental and emotional challenge for the disciples was Jesus' death soon followed by his appearances among them! How challenging for people who had little concept of life after death! The death and resurrection of Jesus was a roller coaster ride of emotions from elation, to confusion to ultimate jubilation.

First came the fanfare of welcome Jesus received on his entry into Jerusalem and the crowds rejoicing- 'Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is coming'. The atmosphere was joyful expectation. Hopes were high for a bright, new, political future for the Jewish nation. But despite the joy of this time, Jesus warned his disciples 'my hour has come' and compared himself to the grain of wheat that must fall to the ground and die. Behind the scenes the chief priest and scribes were planning to arrest Jesus and have him put to death as he was a threat to the status quo.

What panic at the arrest of Jesus. The disciples' reactions were to run away or follow from afar. Peter's confidence 'if I have to die for you, I will never disown you', deserted him completely. It was beyond the disciples' wildest imaginings that Jesus should have endured such a brutal and agonizing death.

Just as they were in the process of coming to terms with the cataclysmic events of the arrest and crucifixion of Jesus, they were challenged again. 'He is alive'. It was an experience of their worlds colliding. Everything was happening that ought not to happen.

The reactions to the news of the empty tomb showed how incomprehensible the news was that 'he is risen'. Peter on hearing the news from Mary of Magdala that the tomb was empty, ran to see for himself. Based solely on an empty tomb, Peter saw and he believed (Jn 20:9). Others had different reactions.

Mary of Magdala stayed near the tomb weeping and had her very moving encounter with Jesus which she reported to the disciples. Whereas the three women in Mark's gospel were terrified they 'came out [of the tomb] and ran away because they were frightened out of their wits; they said nothing to a soul for they were afraid' (Mk 16: 8). Matthew (28:5-8) reports that when the when the angel of the Lord appeared at the tomb 'The guards were so shaken, so frightened...that they were like dead men'. Whereas the women also at the tomb were 'filled with awe and great joy... and ran to tell the disciples.'

When the three women in Luke's gospel find an empty tomb 'they did not know what to think' until two men in bright clothes reassured them that he is risen. When these women reported their experience to the disciples they were not believed because 'their story... seemed pure nonsense' (Lk 24: 10-11).

The two disciples from Emmaus rejoined the gathered disciples and recounted their experience. The first reaction was to dismiss their news as well. At this point Jesus stood among them all. 'In a state of alarm and fright, they [first] thought they were seeing a ghost', once Jesus reassured them it was really him, 'their joy was so great [but] they still could not believe it, and they stood there dumbfounded; until he ate with them' (Lk24: 36- 43). Over the next weeks the consoling appearances of the risen Christ replaced their panic and disbelief with wonder and joyful peace.

May the Risen Christ enliven our wonder and joy in the resurrection of Jesus and grant us the Peace of the Easter Season.

This Week... SCRIPTURE & PRAYER ZONE

First Reading Acts 10:34, 37–43

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead – and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 117:1–2, 16–17, 22–23

R. This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.

Give thanks to the Lord for he is good,

for his love has no end. Let the sons of Israel say: 'His love has no end.' **R**.

The Lord's right hand has triumphed; his right hand raised me up. I shall not die, I shall live and recount his deeds. **R.**

The stone which the builders rejected

has become the corner stone. This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes. **R**.

Second Reading Colossians 3:1–4

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia!

Christ has become our paschal sacrifice;

Let us feast with joy in the Lord. Alleluia!

Gospel John 20:1-9

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'

So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head: this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.
